DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

North one-third of a brick row structure, Victorian-Reconstruction era version of the urban residential row house, built 1871. Two full stories, attic and high basement. Facade three bays wide with well proportioned segment arch windows. Entranceway recessed into the facade providing weather protection.

Asymmetrical interior plan with long, narrow stair hall and passageway at southwest side of the building, parlor filling most of first floor, two bedrooms on the second floor and a single bedroom under sloping ceiling on the third floor.

This section of the row building was restored by present owner, Cole County Historical Society, in 1948 at a cost of \$15,000. John D. Paulus, Jr. was restoration architect. Mr. Paulus is currently Director of the Missouri State Division of Planning and Construction. Renovation at that time included addition of false quoins, bracketed cornice detailing, and suspended awning-type roof over the entranceway.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Primary historical significance of this building derives from its association with Missouri's twentieth Governor, B. Gratz Brown (Governor from 1871 to 1873). Mr. Brown built the house in 1871 on property owned by his wife's family. The Brown family and a sister-in-law lived in the house in the fall of 1871 for the interim months between the razing of the old executive mansion and completion of the present Executive Mansion in January of 1872. (Cole County Historical Society files.) Mr. Brown's father-in-law, Calvin Gunn, who owned the property, was the State Printer. In 1825 Mr. Gunn published The Jeffersonian newspaper in the old state capitol city of St. Charles, Missouri, and moved in 1826 to the City of Jefferson (Jefferson City).

This house and the remaining sections of the row building comprise a relatively uncommon architectural type in outstate Missouri towns. Rows of commercial structures with stores below and living quarters above are prevalent throughout Missouri, however the urban row house of this period opening directly onto the street is a rarity. Built the same year as the Executive Mansion across the street, the row enhances the setting of the mansion by sustaining the homogeneity of the neighborhood.

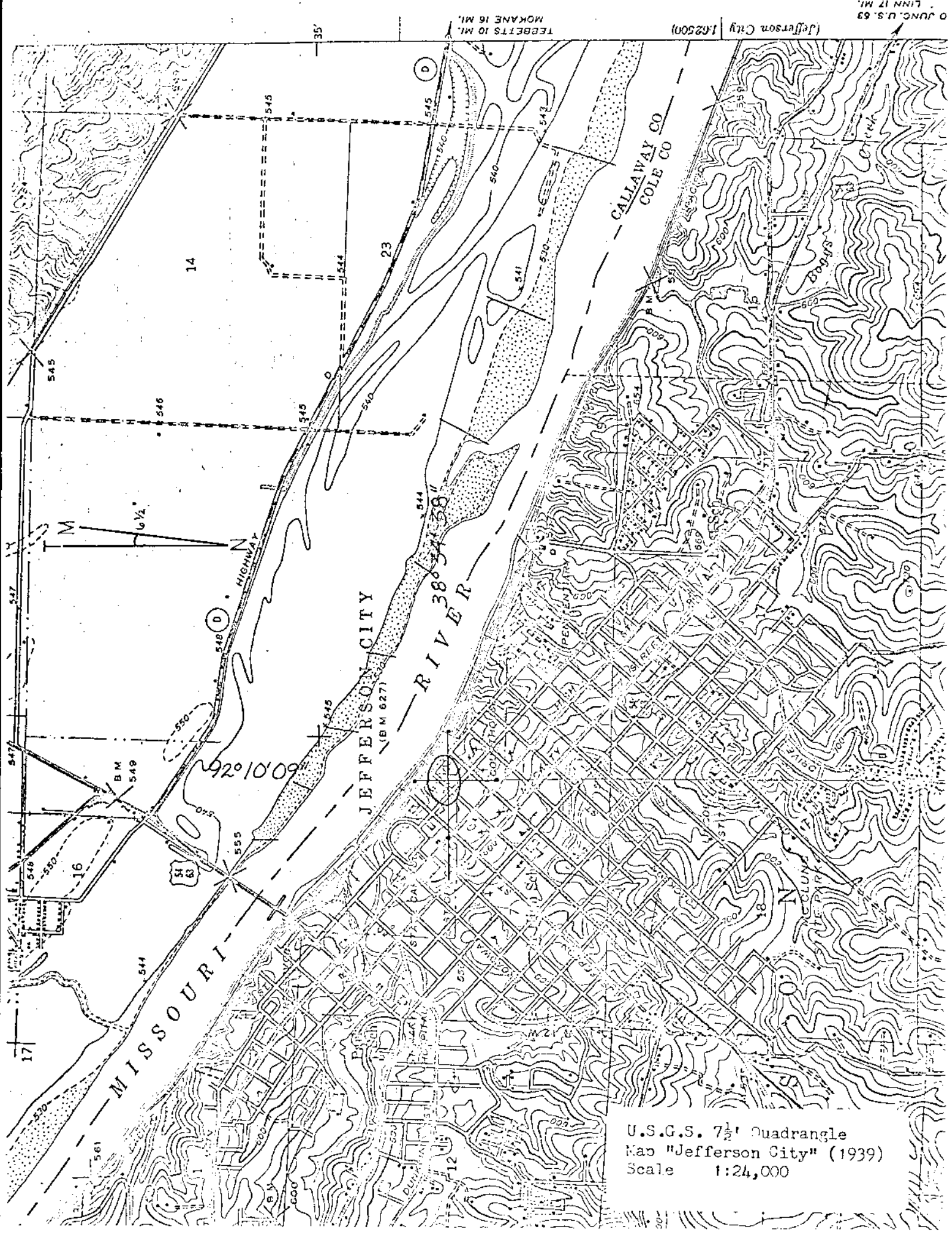

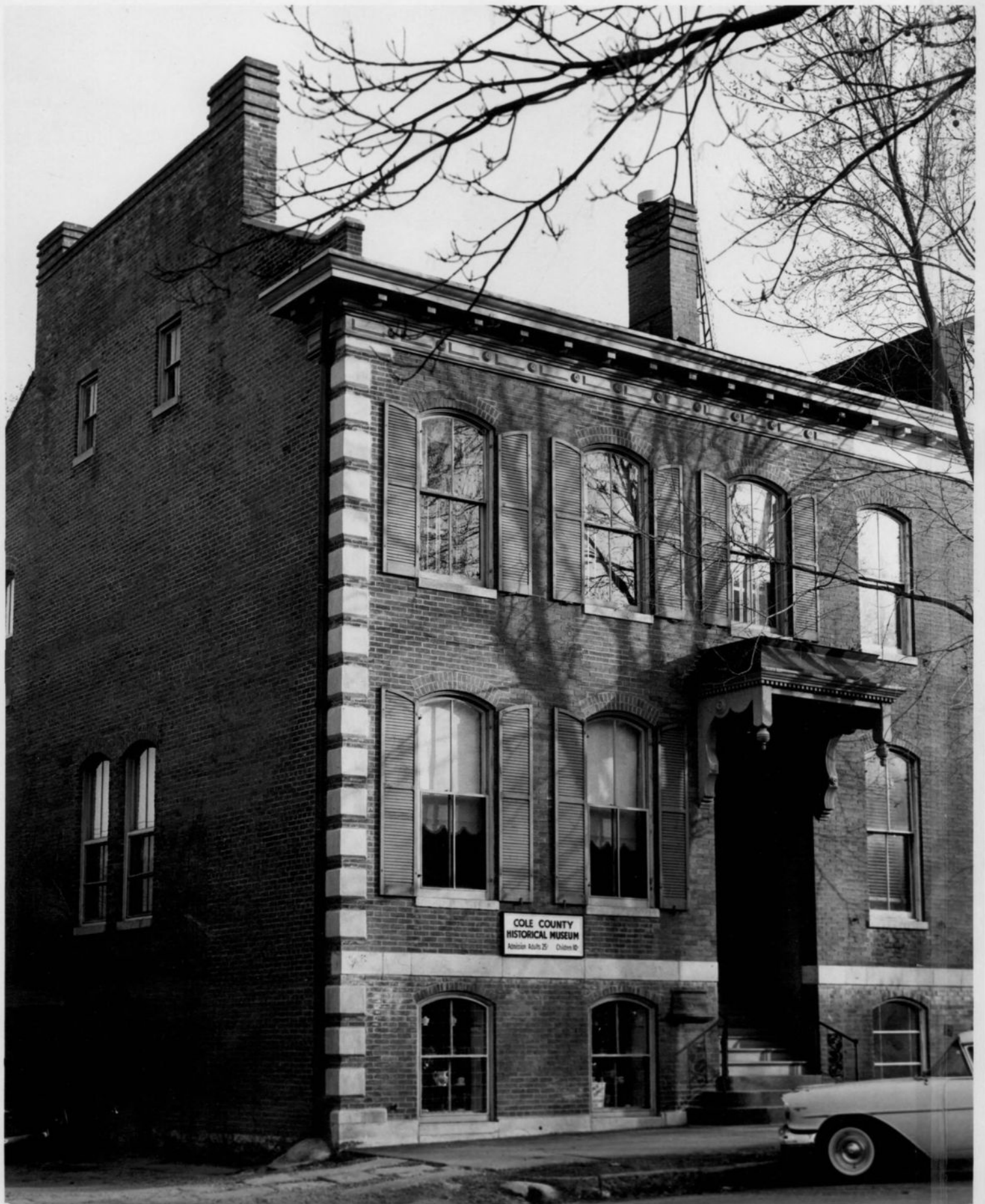
