43. HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE Now known locally as Liberty Hall this building was built in 1855. Built for the Theaterverein, a local dramatic group organized in 1854, it had a stage and drop scenery. Sold after the Civil and used for various purposes it was purchased by the current owners, Knights of Columbus, in the early 1900's.

building has a Circa 1940 one story yellow brick addition on its facade. The hall has its long axis on east and west elevations. These elevations each have four elongated 2/2 double hung windows with wooden sills. Lintels may have been removed. Flat brick lintels are in place now. These oversized windows and floor plan give this building the appearance of a hall. The east elevation contains a simple corbelled brick cornice. This same style of brickwork is present under the north facing gable. The east elevation has a ground level addition.

The rear building, with side gables facing east and west, has a two story yellow brick addition attached to its east elevation. What appears to be an original window can be seen on the north elevation. This is a 6/1 double hung window. Rear or south elevation openings are boarded or infilled by masonry. Brick arches appear over most of these openings.

wooden sills. All openings have brick arches above. A simple corbelled brick cornice is in place on this elevation. The facade of this building faces south (See photo for 24 E. Front St. , right). Here a double leaved wooden loading door is central to the first floor. A single door is in place on the SE corner. Above the first floor double door can be seen double leaved wooden doors on the second and third floors. Windows are 6/6, double hung with wooden sills. All openings have brick arches above. Below the roofline a decorative brick frieze in diaper pattern can be seen. A metal conveyor is attached to the roof.

The interior contains a wooden staircase on the east wall to basement and upper floors. Wooden supports are composed of five heavy wooden boards joined together. Wooden joists are heavy.

One story Building, Circa 1880

This building has a dressed limestone foundation, where it is unaltered on the east elevation and partially on the facade, or north elevation. The facade appears to have had severely deteriorated brick work due to water damage. . New brick work is evident on the NW corner of the facade. An offset wooden door appears on this elevation with brick arch above. Above and to the west of the door a window opening has been infilled with masonry. To the west of this a large and a small opening exist. The larger opening has an elevator accessing below ground level. The second smaller opening is a boarded window. The roofline is flat except where interrupted by a metal shed and vent. The east elevation contains basement level windows. First story windows are 6/6, double hung with wooden sills and brick arches.

here the door is single. This elevation also contains four windows. These are 2/2, double hung. All openings have brick arches above. A simple corbelled brick cornice can be seen below the roofline which is sloped. A wood and metal awning spans this and the building adjacent to the west. A masonry wall with openings separates the rear addition from the building fronting Front St. The building on Front St. has a facade foundation of two different levels. A central wooden door at street level drops to below ground level on the interior from an open elevator. Five of the six facade windows containing glass are 6/6 double hung with wooden sills and brick arches. The roofline here is flat, parapet unadorned. Metal bins rest atop the flat roof.

On the interior wooden supports consist of three long, narrow boards joined together. Wooden joists are heavy on the second floor of the front building. On the first floor or ground level supporting wooden columns and joists are heavy in the front section of the building only. The rear addition may have been used as an office. It has tongue and groove paneling on some interior walls.

in a brick and stone foundation. The foundation level windows were added after 1870 probably by Peter Kappler. Second floor windows are 2/2 double hung and shuttered. Below the roof gables can be seen 6/6 double hung windows. The west facade is the primary facade and faces Lafayette St. A central door was originally in place on the first floor of this elevation. When the grade was changed these openings were altered to windows by masonry infill. A door and decorative cast iron porch were installed where the center window of the first floor facade had been. The first floor is now divided into three bays with floor to ceiling wooden pocket doors seperating the central hall from east bay. A plaster wall with a single door seperates the center hall from west bay. Windows which have been converted from doors and original windows are 6/6 double hung with heavy wooden lintels and wooden sills. On the interior these windows have slanted boxes and beaded trim. The two large "picture windows" on the facade are a circa 1950 alteration. Wooden lintels have been removed. At the rear there was originally an open frame stairs and porch accessing three rooms on the second floor. This also connected the main building with a detached two story brick kitchen. The kitchen is now attached to the main building by a second two story brick addition which adjoins east and west elevations of the two buildings. Circa 1860 the open frame porch was enclosed. A recessed entry with brick arch above can be seen fronting Lafayette. Windows here are 2/2 double hung with brick arches above and wooden sills. A seam in the brickwork seperates this addition from the two bays to the north. Interior stairs are a straight run with decorative newel post. Circa 1950 a new roof was installed over the original on the south elevation changing the roofline to salt box. Originally the pitch over the addition was less steep. The original shingle roof still underlies tin and asphalt additions.

Further significant interior features include an original built in clothes closet on the second floor west, a boxed attic stairway in the same room, beaded woodwork and random width red pine floors throughout the building.

A central entry on Oak St. has been altered to contain a new glass door with side lights. Original entry is evident in brickwork.

The rear elevation has masonry infill to a second story central door and again at SE corner of this elevation. Wooden lintels are still in place.

The east elevation contains a new door at the NE corner. A two story open frame porch is a recent addition. Windows and door have been shortened by masonry infill. Wooden lintels are gone. On the second story porch is accessed by a door. There is no exterior stairway.

The west window contains three lights of glass separated by a wide wooden mullion. There is a wooden panel below the window opening. On the east the window contains nine lights of glass divided by thin wooden mullions. These windows have brick arches above. The second story facade contains a central opening with a fixed single pane of glass. This opening has jambs containing recessed wooden panels similar to those of doors below. The opening contains a flat wooden sill and lintel. Flanking windows are new 12/12 double hung with arched brick above and new brick sills. Six pilasters separate the facade bays. A high parapet is unadorned. The west elevation contains original 6/6 double hung windows with wooden sills and brick arches except where altered. Five bays toward the facade contain new 12/12 windows at the second level. This elevation contains three side entries on the first floor and four on the second.

An attached two story masonry addition at the rear matches in window treatment. A brick cornice continues across the side elevation of this building from the main building. The beginning of the addition is marked by a brick pilaster and change in window height. The east elevation adjoins a concrete block building except at the last six bays toward the rear.

The interior contains large wooden supports and wooden beams running east to west. Pine floors contain random width boards. There is an interior wooden staircase on the east wall of the rear addition. An interior masonry wall separates this addition. Interior woodwork is pedimented. A map dated 1869 called "The Birdseye View of Washington, Mo." shows this building to contain two one story side bays at each end of the facade that are now missing.

in the Mo. Meerschaum office shows this to be a 2½ story federal style building with tin pyramidal hipped roof. The original entry is now reduced by frame infill however the original opening is discernable. Windows are 2/2, double hung, sash is curved at the top. Meerschaum derives from the fact that the Tibbe pipes had the same porous quality as the white, clay-like mineral called meerschaum used in expensive carved pipes of that name. The interior has a mezzanine on the north (facade) elevation. The building is roughly divided in the middle by a wall. The east section of the building has a concrete slab floor while the west section has a dyed concrete floor laid in a grid pattern. Interior woodwork is intact.

First floor facade windows have brick arches and brick sills. This window treatment is the same on the second floor window of the western bay. The two bays to the east of the brick seam, at the second level, have cast iron lintels which are arched and decorative above new doors which lead to a cast iron balcony. An 1860 engraving by E. Robyn contains a detail of this building. At that time the building contained only two bays on the facade. These appear to be the two bays to the west because of the presence of the cast iron lintels. The engraving does not show a window on the first floor of the east elevation. The second floor of that elevation is obscured by tree branches.

hung. Sills are wooden. At the second floor facade a cast iron balcony (replicated from an early photo) is in place, supported by decorative iron brackets. A wooden door with double glass arches and arched transom above accesses the porch. All second story windows are 2/2 double hung with wooden sills and brick arches above. First floor windows are 2/2 double hung with wooden sills and segmental brick jack arches. A wooden cornice contains decorative brackets (replicated on the facade) and wooden chain molding. Three dormers at the facade roofline are pedimented. Wooden dormer brackets are original.

Two story and one story additions are attached at the rear. These form an ell that is stylistically similiar to the main building.

The interior contains a central hall with a straight run staircase with continuous banister to the attic. The staircase is composed of an octagonal newell post, turned balusters and flat banister of walnut. The original plan exists with four rooms on each floor, two rooms in the attic. Double sliding wooden doors seperate a first floor double parlor. Interior wood work is Greek Revival.

Older Section, Circa 1865;

On the south elevation there is evidence of a large opening (Photo left) now bricked in and containing a door opening within the space of the original opening. It is possible that this large opening allowed entry of wagonloads of goods. The east elevation (Photo right) contained five openings just below the cornice. It is possible that these were used as loading chutes into railway cars. The tracks are parallel to the limestone foundation. These openings are now bricked in however brick arches and stone sills are still in place. Recently a garage door has been installed central to this elevation. The west elevation contains evidence of four windows with transoms above now bricked in. Brick arches crown these. Brick piers are in evidence. A new door opening exists. A simple double band of projecting brick forms a cornice. The north elevation is attached to the newer section of the building.

Newer Section, Circa 1905

This section of the building has a dressed limestone foundation. On the north elevation double leaved wooden doors with two levels of three paned transoms above are existing. Windows are 6/6 double hung with limestone sills. Transoms are now boarded. Brick arches are in place above. The corners of the north elevation contain a frieze formed by a corbelled brick motif. Brick pilasters engage at the corners and extend beyond the roofline where they are capped by limestone. The east elevation also contains a double leaved door flanked by 6/6 double hung windows. Here three light transoms are in place above. Vent windows appear above transoms. On this and west elevation the frieze contains corbelling which spans the entire elevation. On the east elevation a brick pier and frieze project from the new section of the building to incorporate the older section of the building.

An early lithograph of this building shows a second story open porch here which was enclosed by a decorative cast iron rail. The porch was supported by wooden posts and spanned only the three center bays of the facade. A recent addition of a broken pediment now crowns this and the door opening on the first floor facade. An old five light transom and four paned side lights are still in place. All facade windows now have colonial style crowned lintels. Second floor facade windows have been altered to french doors. Three dormers on facade roofline and a cupola are further recent additions.

An original door opening on the west elevation, now boarded, has a small five light transom in what appears to be original glass. The door opening is now surrounded by concrete columns and a broken pediment. Double chimneys are visible on side elevations. The west elevation has two windows closed by masonry infill. Remaining windows have straight brick lintels and wooden sills. Wooden shutters are in place on most windows.

The east elevation has a recent one story frame addition. Above this second floor windows have been infilled with masonry.

There is a two story attached addition at the rear. Windows are 2/2, double hung with brick soldier's course sills on the second story. First floor windows are boarded. The foundation is textured concrete.

the facade. A single wooden door with single paned transom is in place. Double wooden doors with six lights of glass each give access to a loading dock on the upper level of the facade. On the second story interior of the main building a steel truss system with radiating steel struts is in place running east to west.

The rear elevation contains 6/6 double hung windows, in a two story brick attached addition. Here an open frame exterior staircase accesses an open frame porch at the second floor. At the rear of the main building a corbelled brick cornice separates second and attic levels and a half sphere window can be seen matching that of the facade.

On the north elevation, in the two story brick addition, a side entry exists with a brick arch above. This entry contains an old wooden door with double lights of glass filling the upper three-fourths of the door. The glass is arched topped and is surrounded by wooden channelling. The bottom of the door contains two recessed wooden panels.

On north elevation steps lead to a side entry near the rear of the building. The facade and rear elevations contain an attic level half sphere window. Only the facade has a stepped parapet. The rear attic window is central under the roof peak. Corbelled brick cornice exists on the facade directly under the parapet caps. Corbelled brick cornice spans the north and south elevations. An opening for a garage door has been created at the ground level of the rear elevation.

302 Jefferson is an addition that existed when an 1895 photograph of both buildings was taken for the Washington Journal in December of that year. This one story masonry building has a stone foundation. A facade entry is off set at the NW corner. Two large single paned storefront windows separated by wooden mullion have transoms above and recessed wooden panels below. These windows appear to be original. A brick parapet is cantilevered out at the top of the building. An aluminum awning spans both the facade of 300 and 302 Jefferson on the first floor. Originally a metal rooved porch supported by wooden posts spanned these facades

* In the 1895 photo of 300 Jefferson from the Washington Journal upper story windows were 2/2 double hung with arched wooden upper sash. Windows had wooden shutters in place.

brick lintels. The facade and north elevations have a frieze and deeply overhung cornice. Windows are set in recessed brick panels except at the second story, outer bays of the facade. Arched surrounds of white glazed terra cotta with a crowning volute are in place above most windows. First floor facade windows are crowned by a shield with the letter "W" on it on the outer bays. Six engaged and fluted doric columns divide the facade bays. A pediment overhangs the facade entry. The facade frieze contains the inscription "1839 City Hall 1923". A white stone stringcourse divides the water table from upper levels. A cornerstone is in place on the NE corner of the facade which bears the date 1923 and architects names; Boyer and Baum.
